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Ackworth Report From David Oates

There are 5 pubs that currently serve Cask Real Ale through hand pumps in Ackworth. The Angel, Boot and Shoe, Brown Cow, Masons Arms and the Rustic Arms. All of these, other than the Masons, also serve food. The Masons is hoping to start with food in the not too distant future.

The quite recently closed Electric Theatre in Brackenhill is being renovated and refurbished by Brett Stenton, off the Counting House fame in Pontefract, and will soon become the Prohibition 1915 Bar and Grill. Jabs, the appointed manager, is hoping the new venture will open towards the end of October. We at CAMRA wish them well and hope the Bar and Grill will add to the Ackworth Real Ale Scene.



Leah Taylor, the Bar and Entertainments Manager at the recently extended and refurbished Cricket Club reported back to me that the 4th Annual Ackworth Beer Festival that took place over the last weekend in September was very successful. It was 'steady on Friday night, busy all day Saturday and even

busier on Sunday'. There were 6 different Cask Ales on all the time over the 3 days. There were 2 different Casks on from each of 3 different breweries: Ashover Brew Company, Clay Cross, Derbyshire; Imperial Brewing Company, Mexborough, South Yorkshire; and the White Rose Brewery, also from Mexborough.

News since the Summer O to K Edition:

Angel: Brett Stenton has taken over the lease. Local resident Becky, who worked in the Angel under previous long-time leaseholders, Julie and Dean, is the new bar manager. The very good news for the pub regulars, and other Ackworth and Wakefield District Real Ale drinkers, is that they have continued to have consistently very good quality Black Sheep Bitter available. The second handpump has served Black Sheep Blonde in recent weeks. The Blonde was good on my most recent visit. Becky says they intend to continue with a guest from different Yorkshire breweries changing on a two weekly basis. A new food menu has been introduced. A new decking area is now completed at the front and further improvements are to take place to the adjacent the beer garden.



Boot and Shoe: Ossett White Rat continues to be the regular Real Ale available. There is usually a second Real Ale available. On my most recent visit it was Timothy Taylor's Landlord. The Christmas Pizza Menu runs from the 1st to the 24th December.

Brown Cow: Timothy Taylor's Boltmaker and Ossett Blonde are the 2 permanent Real Ales on the hand pump. A new food menu was launched in mid September.

Masons Arms: Congratulations to Neil and Bev, and all the team, on their re-entry in to the CAMRA National Good Beer Guide, that is covered in more detail elsewhere in this edition.



The popular Bradfield Blonde (4.0%) and Farmers Bitter (4.0%) are the 2 permanent Real Ales. Neil is currently continuing with a third 'seasonal' Bradfield beer on the other hand pump. Currently, it is Jack o' Lantern, a 4.2% bitter. The locals are eagerly awaiting the arrival of the festive season Belgian Blue. Live entertainment on Saturdays from 9:00pm and Sundays from 4:00pm have now again become well established and are proving to be very popular.

Rustic Arms: A weekly rotating guest Real Ale, regionally or nationally sourced, is usually available. Recent real ales have included Black Sheep Bitter, Timothy Taylor's Landlord and Wadsworth Horizon (4%). A Halloween quiz will take place on Friday 31st October, 8:30pm. A new Christmas Menu will start in late November.

Harry's Bar - Summer Pub Of The Season

We presented our latest award to this award winning one room traditional Real Ale pub, down an alleyway just off Westgate in the Centre of Wakefield.



Kieran and Shellie, who recently took over running of Harry's Bar were presented with the certificate by Mark Goodair, Wakefield and District CAMRA Chair.

The real fire, in the bare brick and wooden pub interior, adds to the warm, cosy welcome and will be most appreciated in the coming colder autumn and winter days and nights. Harry's bar is a long time, established entrant in the CAMRA National Good Beer Guide.

The Pub of the Season is a quarterly award, in line with the four seasons, voted for by Wakefield and District CAMRA Branch Members. A short list of the four top pubs is drawn up from the branch members nominations. All 600 plus branch members are then entitled and invited to vote on these four pubs, with the winner being crowned the Pub Of The Season. These all have consistently high quality Real Ale and a good and welcoming atmosphere for its regulars and visitors alike. The winners of the award are often nominated, and short listed, by branch members for the overall annual Pub Of the Year Award.

Harry's Bar was awarded the Pub Of The Year in 2017. The four Pubs Of The Season each year are automatic nominations for the National Good Beer Guide. The 2026 Good Beer Guide will be available online through the CAMRA website or in bookshops from the end of September 2025.

Scott Nightingale, Wakefield and District CAMRA Pubs Officer, spoke on behalf of all its members at the presentation evening in saying, 'Congratulations to Kieran and Shellie, and all the staff on continuing to keep Harry's Bar a great pub'

The Brewers 1841

Having read the pub guide in Spring's O to K issue 95 and having read a review of the pub in this year's Good Beer Guide I wanted to provide an up to date review of The Brewers 1841 (as was the old Brewers Pride).

Now managed by Dom, the name changed following the completion of the refurbishment in late 2024. Since moving into Ossett from Bradford this was the stand out pub for me and became my regular. I was a bit nervous to see how the refurbishment would transpire and whether the pub would lose its character, however I was very pleased with the outcome which kept many aspects of the old pub, including the plaque to sadly missed regular Malcolm Poole.

As you'd expect, a wide range of the Ossett brewery ales are available alongside guest ales from Phoenix, Horbury and Rudgate at time of writing, real cider is also available (Lilleys Tropical at time of writing) and CAMRA members receive a 10% discount on real ale (unsure on the cider as I don't drink it).



In addition the pub is dog friendly and most importantly now has disabled access via a ramped entrance at the rear of the pub. Whilst toilets were moved upstairs as part of the refurbishment, there is an accessible toilet on the ground floor which is accessed via a RADAR key kept behind the bar.

The pub is also now a pizzeria and there's a wide selection of pizzas available along with other snacks.

There's a good quiz night every Monday, regular open mic nights and bands.

If you've not been I would recommend a visit.

CAMRA Good Beer Guide is a 'testament to the remarkable resilience of publicans' amid drop in brewery numbers and sky-high tax burden

CAMRA has published the 2026 Good Beer Guide along with a clear message to the Chancellor: it's a make-or-break moment for the future of independent brewers and consumer choice.

The Guide is the definitive guidebook to pubs that serve great cask beer across the UK, and uses an independent, volunteer-led selection process that makes it the authoritative and trusted voice of cask beer drinkers.

Ash Corbett-Collins, CAMRA Chairman, said:

"This really is a make-or-break Budget for the Chancellor. It's time for the Government to decide if they're pro pubs and independent brewers, or if they are going to reign over the demise of the Great British Pub. Consumers want decisive action to get independent beers onto bars and allow pubs to thrive.

"Each edition of the Good Beer Guide is a collectible snapshot of beer and pub culture that year. This year's Guide is a testament to the remarkable resilience of publicans, continuing to achieve excellence and choice for consumers despite a backdrop of sky-high tax bills and a lack of action from Government. The Chancellor needs to use the upcoming Budget to slash the tax burden on pubs, including VAT, duty and National Insurance contributions."

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A Good Meal And A Decent Pint - The Ninth, Castleford

A visit to the Ninth in Castleford was long overdue; in fact it may well have been the ninth time that I had said that we really must get there to sample the food. So I finally made it, accompanied by Mr and Mrs Chief Inspector Locale And Pubs Officer, Scott and Toni to you and me.



Did you know that the Ninth is named after the Roman Legion linked with Castleford, formerly Lagentium? Neither did I until I took the trouble to find out.



The Ninth is easy to find, located on Sagar Street just off the pedestrianised main street. It's a welcome addition to the Castleford ale scene. Several real ale outlets are needed to make a town an ale destination and that's what Castleford now has.

I am happy to describe the place a "quirky" since they themselves describe the Ninth as "quirky and cool". They have a varied selection of craft keg on offer but there are also 2 handpulls which at the time of our visit had Black Sheep and a collab between Abbeydale and

Loch Lomond called "Live, Laugh, Loch Lomond". The Black Sheep was more to our taste on this occasion. The cask selection does mix new brews and old favourites.

Sunday roasts are a bit of a speciality here. The main menu has a most impressive range of small plates at 3 for £20. These would make a good starter, a light meal or a sharing feast for 2 or more. Burgers (£15) and sharers (eg Ploughman's for 2) complete the selection.

It was a Thursday evening so the midweek deal was on offer and there were already quite a few in. On Wednesdays and Thursdays for £17 you can have a drink and a choice of three tempting main courses. The dishes do vary from week to week but on this occasion there was steak and Black Heart Stout pie, a Thai green chicken curry board with Thai vegetable cakes and garlic naan or Parmesan Crusted Cod. I selected the pie, Toni selected the Thai board and Scott preferred a choice from the burger menu. All three meals were first rate and I must say that the Thai board looked really special when it came. It certainly did not disappoint. With a drink thrown in, these quality midweek specials are very good value for money.



It's advisable to book for a meal, which is good to know. At the time of writing, Christmas and New Year are filling up quickly.

Beer Online 6 - The Last Days Of Porter

In this issue we go back to 1973 and the BBC Archive on You Tube for a news report from Northern Ireland that is less news and more poetry.

For reporter Larry McCoubrey delivers a poetic send-off for Porter which had been stopped being brewed during that year.



In describing Porter he says how it is drawn from two barrels, "a high one first, to give it a bit of life, a good glass of gushing good cheer that settles slowly towards the bottom of the glass into a thick contented cream. It takes several minutes for that cream to substantiate towards the bottom of the glass when it's ready for the muscle and sinew, the real body of the drink itself and that comes from the other barrel and if it's all drawn

properly the way it should be done the cream is borne majestically above to form a clerical collar that proves the goodness in its heart and the true porter drinker would look upon such a glass with great reverence indeed"



He goes deep! But it is amazing to see how the beer is served from the two barrels, in these days when old styles are revived I wonder if any brewer would dare to try and recreate this.



It's a wonderful piece of history, of a completely different type of beer to what we drink today and well worth watching.

Wakefield CAMRA Days Out - Codsall and Burton September 20th

Codsall

After a two and half hour coach journey our first stop was to the Camra Club of the Year, The Firs in Codsall. Our branch received a warm welcome from Anna and her staff, five changing beers, Bushwacker from Wye Valley was my 1st choice and an excellent beer, refreshing to see they had homemade Scotch eggs on and some excellent sandwiches (cobs as they are known here) made on site, corned beef and onion and a cheese with black pudding followed by a Bunting's Blonde (Utttoxeter) also on fine form. A few Local CAMRA branch members met up with us and showed us round.



Next stop Codstall Station a converted waiting room run by Holden's, a really busy pub but a meeting point for Wolves fans who were playing Leeds at home on this day, time for some of us to keep quiet! Holden's Black Country Bitter for me with another 2 on offer from same brewery and a couple of guests.



Next Love & Liquor, a converted shop in the middle of Codsall with five wickets on here. I had to try my favourite beer here, Titanic Plum Porter! It didn't disappoint. Ali the owner was very welcoming and it was great atmosphere in the bar.

Great pub, devoured a bag of BJ Pork Scratchings before our next call.

Beeropolis – micropub renamed in 2021

two cask beers on and plenty of keg, I tried the 5% Vanilla infused Porter “Wot The Duck” from Dancing Duck Brewery, so smooth and tasty. Busy little bar.

Devonshire Arms- Four changing beers on here, very busy pub, Arbor Light 3.6% from Whim Ales and a tasty session ale.

Last Heretic – smart micropub with 5 changing beers on here, made very welcome by Pete the owner with another Dancing Duck beer for me the 4.5% Dark Drake, another winner for me. Also sampled the insanely hot pickled onions – not for the faint hearted and the slightly milder pickled eggs., I think Carolina reaper peppers spring to mind. Cracking pub.



Our final stop was the Roebuck Inn – friendly corner pub with Draught Bass on although I tried a Gates

Burton Brewery “Reservoir” 4.6% another excellent ale in a lovely pub.



Shame I missed Coopers Tavern (sadly closed), Elms Inn and Weighbridge Inn so another trip I will make. Burton never disappoints.



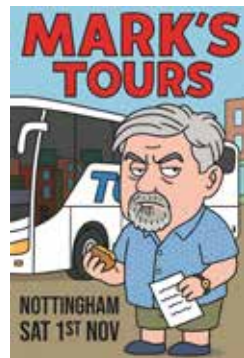

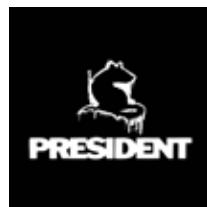
Ossett Brewery

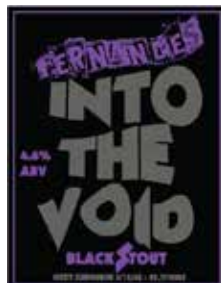
Punch Rat, a 6.7% Pina Colada NEIPA and Hazy Rat a 4.3% Session IPA.
